#### **Property Address & Access**

The Burleson property is located at 12359 State Route 690, Athens, OH 45701. There are three main access points: 1) The main driveway along State Route 690; 2) An entrance to a bottomland field along Dutch Creek Road (County Road 34); and 3) An entrance to an access lane, also along Dutch Creek Road. This last access point is on the south end of a 0.541-acre parcel, the only part of the Burleson property located within Canaan Township. There are good roads and trails all through the property and no obstacle to managing it for commercial timber production due to access.

#### **Does the Landowner Reside on the Property?**

No. However, there is a house located there.

#### **Nearest City or Town**

The Burleson property is located about halfway between Athens and Amesville, halfway, that is, along a straight line running southwest-northeast through these two points.

## 5. Schedule of Management Activities

2024-2027	All	189.986	Locate and mark your property boundaries by applying brightly colored paint to trees and fenceposts along the perimeter at a distance of no more than 50 or 60 feet between marks.	
2024-2029	8 & 9	26.5	If possible, complete all of the following work in these two stands in the allotted time: 1) <b>Do your best to eradicate the worst non-native, invasive species</b> , specifically ailanthus or tree-of-heaven and bush honeysuckle. 2) <b>Cut, treat, pull, and otherwise control all other non-native, invasive species</b> with a goal of eventual eradication. 3) <b>Cut grapevines that are growing in timber-producing and mast-bearing trees.</b> You can leave grapevines that are growing in weed trees, scrub trees, non-crop trees, and dead trees. You can also leave poison-ivy vines and Virginia creeper vines, as these do not harm trees. 4) <b>Undertake other timber stand improvement (TSI) work</b> , including weeding, thinning, crop tree release, and cull tree removal, all with the advice and assistance of a professional forester or well-qualified forestry technician. <b>Also, work on converting Stand 9 from an old-field stand to an oak-hickory stand.</b> Be aware that some of what you cut may have commercial value.	

2024-2034	6 & 2/3 (part)	9.5 + acreage in Stand 2/3	Continue the same kind of work in Stand 6 and the upper edges of Stand 2/3.	
2024-2034 and after	7	4.2	Continue the same kind of work in Stand 7.	
2024-2034 and after	10	13.25	Continue the same kind of work in Stand 10. If possible, begin converting this stand from a typical bottomland/riparian stand to a high-quality, high-value stand of black walnut and other hardwoods. Be aware that there are merchantable trees in Stand 10. These may be sold as sawlogs, pallet logs, or blocking material.	
2024-2034 and after	2/3	Up to 48.4 acres	Continue the same kind of work in Stand 2/3.	
2024-2034 and after	1 & 5	Wherever found	Begin work on controlling, eventually to eradicate, non-native, invasive species.	
2033-2034	All	189.986	Update your forest management plan so as to maintain your status under CAUV.
